#### Final Countdown

On Board 9 the undisciplined bidding that was a feature of the match saw China gain 11 IMPs. North, holding ♠KQ1075 ♥KJ863 ♦10 ♣42 opened 2♥ and saw his partner raise to 3♥. When his vulnerable opponents reached 3NT (which was cold) he bid 4♥ and lost 1100.

Finally on Board 14 neither team reached the excellent 7♣ with ♠AQ ♡AJ982 ♦86 ♣AK94 facing ♠102 ♡4 ♦AKQJ107 ♣QJ43 (what is more South had bid spades over the 1♦ opening) but China gained 9 IMPs for bidding 6♦ when Chinese Taipei stopped in 4NT at the other table.



Japan Imax faced Chinese Taipei in the final round of Dealer West the Senior teams. It turned out be a low scoring affair, Both Vul usually the sign of a well contested match.



South led the seven of spades and declarer won in dummy and played a club to the king and ace. A spade to dummy was followed by a club to the queen, North pitching a spade, and declarer ruffed a spade and claimed +150.

South led a spade and declarer won in dummy and played a club to the king and ace. A spade to the ace was followed by a second club and when North discarded the ace of hearts declarer allowed South to win with the jack. Declarer won the diamond switch round. and claimed ten tricks, +430 and 7 IMPs to Japan.

West led the five of diamonds and declarer played the percentages by playing low. Declarer took East's queen with the ace and ran the jack of clubs, repeating the finesse when it held. East won and played a diamond and West won and returned a diamond. With the hearts breaking declarer had ten tricks, +630.

I would be happy to overcall INT with the North hand, as it gets the strength over in one bid, but it is to some extent a matter of taste.

North led the ace of hearts and when South played the ten he continued with the king and jack. Declarer won with the queen, played the queen of diamonds, a diamond to the ace and a diamond to the king. He cashed the last diamond and then played a spade to the ten. When the queen fell on the third round he was home, +400.

This time when North led the ace of hearts South played the six. North continued with the king and eight of hearts and declarer won. When he played a club North pounced and cashed dout for one down, +50 and 10 IMPs to Chinese Taipei.

In a low scoring encounter Chinese Taipei had won 21-20 - every IMP counts.

### Playoff - China v Chinese Taipei Open Teams


Towards the end of a major championship the Bulletin runs into a problem. With time running out and space at a premium how do you cover the final stages of the tournament?

It is not unusual for the last day's play to be neglected completely, (although we made an exception in 2003 when we included coverage of the dramatic deal that decided the 2003 Bermuda Bowl Final between the USA and Italy).

A perennial problem that there is no real answer to is what happens is the boards are dull?

It's not easy to write an exciting account of a 0-0 soccer match and the same is true for bridge. In the first session of the Open Teams playoff between China and Chinese Taipei the players managed to create a fair degree of interest from a dull looking set of deals.


East led the seven of clubs and declarer won with the ace, drew trumps and played a heart. When dummy's queen held he played a club and was +140.

South led a spade and North took three rounds and the played ace of clubs and a club. Declarer won in dummy and ran the eight of hearts. He won the diamond return in hand, ruffed a club and played a heart. When the king appeared he won, cashed a diamond and claimed, +110 and 6 IMPs to China.

West led the two of hearts and declarer ruffed in dummy and played a diamond to the queen and ace. West switched to the five of clubs and declarer went up with dummy's ace, cashed the ace of spades and played a spade. East won with the king and played a club, West winning with the king and returning a club. Declarer ruffed with the nine of spades, drew the outstanding trump, cashed the nine of clubs and played a diamond. When he put up the king he was three down, -500, rather than +590.

Note that West could have returned a diamond at various points to ensure a one trick defeat.



West could have doubled on the first round to show a six card minor and a four card major, but only if INT was strong. he might have doubled 2♠ but it was not without risk. The contract drifted two down, -200.



North led the jack of diamonds and South won and switched to a trump. North won with the jack and returned a trump. With the spade finesse wrong declarer had to go one down, -100 and 7 IMPs to Chinese Taipei.

3NT would make on a spade or low diamond lead.

China picked up 6 IMPs when Chinese Taipei stopped short of game with ♠1098 ♥Q963 ♦AQ7 ♣K105 opposite ♠AQJ73 ♥J107 ♦K ♣A972. The opponents could score two hearts and a heart ruff, but the spade king was onside, so 4♠ and 3NT were easy, China scoring +430.

East led the four of diamonds and declarer won with the ace and exited with the jack of clubs. West won and switched to the king of spades. Declarer took the ace and played the two of hearts. East won with the Open Room ace and returned the eight of spades. West won, played back a diamond and East won and played a spade for West to ruff, one down, -50.


East led the eight of diamonds for the jack, king and ace Closed Room and declarer returned a diamond. East won with the queen and switched to the four of clubs. West took the ace and switched to the king of spades. Declarer won and played a spade to the ten and queen. he ruffed the club return and tried the king of hearts. East won and played a spade for West to ruff and the queen of hearts was the setting trick, one down and 2 IMPs to 24 China.

There was no rush to play a second spade. If declarer had tried the king of hearts at that point instead eight tricks would have been easily avaliable.

On Board 12 both teams reached 3NT with  $\Phi$ Q **♥AQ|8 ♦AKQ96 ♣1098 facing ♠764 ♥72 ♦43** 

AQJ532. When West was declarer North led a spade from \$K8532 and when South's ace drew the queen the defenders had no trouble taking the first five tricks. At the other table East was the declarer and South led the jack of spades, so the suit was blocked. However, according to the official score declarer went one down. The club and heart finesses were onside and diamond were 3-3, so you could make 6♣.


#### Heart raise

It seems unlikely you will make ten tricks opposite a passed partner. West played three rounds of spades and with two aces to come that was two down, -500 and 9 IMPs to China.

With ♠874 ♥10 ♦J943 ♠KQ953 opposite ♠K ♥AKJ53 ♦AK76 ♣AJ2 China reached 6♦. There were no miracles and the contract was two down. Chinese Taipei stopped in 5♣, but trumps were 4-1 and declarer did not find the winning line, going the same two down.

On the next deal, when North (at red) opened  $2^{\circ}$  with  $^{\circ}$ K74  $^{\circ}$ Q108742  $^{\diamond}$ 108  $\stackrel{\bullet}{\bullet}$ K2 and East overcalled  $3\stackrel{\bullet}{\bullet}$  South thought it was a good idea to jump to  $4^{\circ}$  holding  $\stackrel{\bullet}{\bullet}$ 9863  $^{\circ}$ AK6  $^{\diamond}$ J9762  $\stackrel{\bullet}{\bullet}$ 5. West doubled for +500. With no game on for EW that gave Chinese Taipei 9 IMPs.

South led the eight of hearts and declarer ruffed and played the five of spades. South went in with the queen and played another heart (ace of clubs and a club is good enough to beat the contract). Declarer drew trumps and played the seven of diamonds. When South followed with the four he put up dummy's ace, and was two down, -500.

South led the eight of hearts and declarer ruffed and played the five of spades. When South withheld the queen declarer played the two of diamonds to the five, eight and jack. When South returned the four of diamonds declarer ran it to his queen and played three rounds of trumps. South won and cashed the ace of clubs but declarer had the rest, +790 and 15 IMPs to China.

Having ducked the queen of spades South missed a second chance when he took the first diamond. If he ducks he can cover the next diamond and declarer is snookered.

On the other hand, if declarer had foreseen this possibility he would have played the ten of diamonds from dummy. Now if South ducks declarer ruffs heart, plays two top trumps and then the queen of diamonds, ducking when South covers. He wins the diamond return and plays another diamond, pitching a club. South can ruff but must surrender a club trick.

At the end of this 'dull' session China led 45-31.
