European Youth Team Championships 2015

The Final Round – Poland v Turkey (U26)

Going into the final round, Poland led the U26 Championship by 1.87 VPs from Sweden with Norway 8.48 VPs behind. A draw would therefore ensure the silver medal for the Poles, but they hadn't come this far to settle for anything less than gold. Behind Norway, England and Netherlands were waiting to pounce should the host nation falter at the last, but only the top three could still win the European title.

For this final round, I will concentrate on the match between the leaders, Poland, and Turkey, and keep my fingers crossed that the decisive action doesn't happen elsewhere. Our match started with a slam board.

Wojciech Kazmierczak's weak two-suited opening put a lot of momentum into the auction. Can Erdem Tukenmez overcalled and Fatih Aydin was far too strong for a simple game bid so cuebid – initially just an invitational-plus spade raise. When Tukenmez accepted the invitation, the Turks were off to the races and soon settled in the small slam. With any three-zero trump split pretty much marked as the length with South, and North a strong favourite to hold the king of hearts, 6♠ is an excellent contract and duly rolled in for +980.

The Turks do not play two-suited weak openings so Can Korkmaz passed as dealer in the other room. Kamil Nowak opened the East hand at the one level and Pawel Jassem's two-over-one response forced to game. When Nowak bid his spades for a third time, Jassem made a slam try, but the order of the suits meant that he would have had to commit to the five level to show the diamond control and he was not inclined to go past game with such a balanced hand with no source of tricks. Meanwhile, Nowak could not go on when looking at two low diamonds, so the slam was missed. To be fair, with no heart opening at this table, it was a slightly sub-par contract anyway. Plus 480 meant 11 IMPs to Turkey, and Poland's lead in the competition had not survived a single deal as Sweden moved into a narrow lead. Elsewhere, England lost 11 IMPs while Netherlands gained the same number to move ahead of them into fourth place.

On Board 1, we saw a weak two-level opening make it easier to reach a making slam on the opposing cards. Here we see the reverse effect as Michal Klukowski's two-suited opening took away any chance for the Turkish pair to have a normal exploratory auction. Aydin overcalled and Tukenmez closed proceedings with 3NT, where he made 12 tricks after a spade lead for +690.

In the other room, there was no pre-emptive opening. The Poles quickly found the diamond fit and initially seemed to be exploring for the best game. However, Nowak always had greater things in mind and his 4♣ continuation over 3NT informed Jassem that this was actually a slam exploration. When Jassem co-operated with a heart cuebid, Nowak took control and, on discovering that the queen of trumps was missing when Jassem bid 5♠ in response to the queen ask, settled for the small slam.

Deniz Unalan led his singleton heart. Nowak won in hand with the queen, cashed a top diamond then crossed to the king of spades to lead the jack of diamonds. When Korkmaz followed with the nine, he assumed there was no four-one split and rose with the king then conceded a diamond so that the defence could not interrupt his future plans. Winning the return in hand, he ruffed out the hearts and had 12 tricks for +1370 and 12 IMPs to Poland. They led in the match by 14-11 and also in the overall standings. Meanwhile, England now led their match while Netherlands trailed in theirs, so England were back up to fourth. Norway also picked up 12 IMPs here to cement their third place.

Poland picked up another 8 IMPs on Board 4, where Jassem/Nowak stopped safely in INT+2 while Aydin/Tukenmez were down two for –200 in a thin no trump game. It was 22-11 in favour of Poland.


Aydin made a simple overcall and Kazmierczak introduced his clubs then cuebid before raising clubs to the four level. Perhaps he would have done better to try 3♦ over 3♣ and now Klukowski might have bid 3♠ to ask for a stopper. As it was, Klukowski couldn't see what game was going to make so passed 4♣. He was right in a sense, as they had just passed the making game. Four Clubs made on the nose, Kazmierczak losing two spades and the king of clubs; +130.

In the other room, Jassem made a weak jump overcall and Korkmaz bid 2NT, asking for 3♣ to allow him to compete in that suit. However, with strong reversing values, Unalan made his natural rebid and now Korkmaz bid 3NT. The defence played three rounds of spades but Jassem did not have a semblance of an entry so the king of clubs was the only other trick for the defence; +430 and 7 IMPs to Turkey, who closed to 18-22.

On Board 7, Kazmierczak, possibly affected by having just missed game on Board 6, made a very aggressive try for game and was down one in a hopeless 5♦ while Korkmaz played in partscore for +130 and 6 IMPs to Turkey, and they had the lead at 24-22.

After seven boards, Poland trailed by 22-24, Sweden led by 34-0 and Norway led by 25-0 (after six boards). Sweden led by over 5 VPs and Norway were within 5 VPs of second-placed Poland. Lower down the rankings, Netherlands were collapsing and over 30 IMPs down to Bulgaria. That meant that France, over 30 IMPs ahead against Italy, were up to fifth ahead of the Dutch. the England match was almost level.

Poland picked up a couple of minor swings to move into a narrow lead in the match and then...

Tukenmez passed as dealer so the Poles had the auction to themselves. Kazmierczak's second call of 2♥ was not FSF but, rather an artificial game force, a puppet to 2♠ so that he could then continue to describe his hand. When he persuaded Klukowski to show a heart control, that fit his hand perfectly and he asked for key cards then bid the cold slam for +1430 after a top diamond lead.

In the other room, Nowak opened the East hand and the Turkish N/S pair were in a totally different situation. I am sure that North's combination of bids should be a slam try – with only game in mind he would have bid 4♠ over 2NT – but the whole situation was unclear and Unalan was never going to bid on when looking at a minimum overcall and singleton spade. Plus 680 meant 13 IMPs to Poland, who led by 40-24.

Both Norths started with an artificial game force and both Easts made a pre-emptive overcall. For Tukenmez, that meant a jump to 3♦, over which Klukowski could show his second suit without too much pain and, when Kazmierczak made an almost obligatory cuebid, he could sign off in 4♥ to limit his hand. Klukowski won the diamond lead, drew trumps and, mindful of the bidding, played West for the club length by running the jack. He had 12 tricks now for +480.

For Nowak, a pre-emptive overcall meant 4♦, and that made Unalan's showing of the second suit a little more stressful. However, when Korkmaz cuebid the diamond control, Unalan followed through with a spade cuebid and found himself in 6♥.

Jassem led the king of spades. Unalan won that and drew trumps and, with 22 IMPs hanging on his next play, led a club to the ace so was down one for -50 and 11 IMPs to Poland. Though Nowak had shown out on the second heart, he surely still rated to be the shorter defender in clubs, given his leap to 4♦, but at the table you have to play them the way they feel at the time,

This double whammy had propelled Poland into a 51-24 lead. As nothing much had happened for a while in the Swedish match, Poland was also back on top of the rankings, with Sweden also losing a game swing to give the Poles a little breathing space. Elsewhere, Norway led by 28 after 14 deals, England trailed by 4 after 11, France had dropped a few but still led by 25 after 14, and Netherlands had turned things around to lead by 17 IMPs after 13 boards and move back up to fourth. That Dutch recovery was largely due to one of the most remarkable results I have ever seen at any championship on Board 10. While the Bulgarian N/S bid to 6♠ for a solid +1430, their E/W pair defended 1♥ redoubled, making all 13 tricks for the score of -3120, and 17 IMPs to Netherlands!

Jassem opened the natural variety of Polish Club, showing 15+ with five or more clubs, and doubled for take-out at his next turn. Nowak now drove to game – Jassem could have been stronger than this, when game could have been very good.

Unalan led a low spade to the bare ace and Nowak led a club to his king then back to the queen and ace. The nine of spades was covered by queen and king and Unalan cleared the suit. Nowak cashed his red winners then exited with a diamond in hope of endplaying Korkmaz to lead into the club tenace at the end, but it was Unalan who won the diamond and he could claim the rest of the tricks for down three and -300.

At the other table, Aydin opened a standard 1♣ then made a support double. He was willing to defend 2♠, but Tukenmez competed with 3♣ and that pushed Klukowski up a level.

It looked as though 3♠ might be one too many, but Klukowski managed to bring it home. Aydin led the queen of clubs so he won the ace and led a heart to the jack and ace. Aydin cashed the ace of spades, which did Klukowski no harm, then switched back to clubs, Klukowski ruffing out the king. He led his low diamond next and Aydin did not read the position so played low and the queen scored. That gave Klukowski an entry to lead a second heart up, Tukenmez rising with the king and returning a club, which was just what Klukowski wanted. He ruffed, played queen of hearts and ruffed his last heart, ruffed a club and exited with the king of diamonds to make the king and jack of spades at the end for +140 and hold the loss on the board to 4 IMPs. Nicely played, but what were the defenders thinking about?

Poland still led by 23 IMPs after 15 boards but Sweden had overtaken them with a double game swing on Board 13, making 4♠ one way and 4♠ the other, to lead their match by 43 IMPs. Norway was still safely in third while England was back ahead of Netherlands in fourth with France sixth. and then it was time for yet another twist at the top.

Those weak two-suited openings do seem to come up a lot, and in this match it seemed that they only came up on deals where the opposition had to decide whether or not to play slam.

Kazmierczak's 2♥ opening took crucial space away from the Turks. Tukenmez overcalled 2♠ and, with no great spade fit but plenty of high cards and a double heart stopper, Aydin simply jumped to 3NT so slam was never even in the picture.

It could have been worse. Had Kazmierczak led his second suit, the defence would have been able to take the first five tricks and 3NT would have been defeated. As it was, he led the queen of hearts and Aydin took his ten winners for +430.

At the other table there was no weak opening from North so the Polish E/W pair had the auction to themselves and made good use of the space available to them. Two Clubs was game-forcing, either natural or with support. Nowak showed his minimum then the club support and a series of cuebids saw them bid smoothly to the small slam; +920 and 10 IMPs to Poland.

The Poles led by 39 IMPs with three boards to play but were less than a VP ahead of Sweden, who led their match by 48 with five boards to play. Norway were third, while Netherlands had just sneaked past England again. Poland gained 6 IMPs on Board 18 when Turkey went down in partscores at both tables, but the Turks got 7 back on Board 19 when they made partscores at both tables. It was fitting, at the end of a wild and exciting set, that the last board of the championship should be yet another slam.

Aydin opened 1♣, three-plus cards, and the 2♠ response showed 9-11 with five-plus spades and four-plus hearts. Two No Trump asked and 3♠ showed the sixth spades. After an exchange of cuebids Aydin checked on key cards and bid the small slam. Klukowski led a low diamond and, with no fast discard available to him, Tukmenez had no option but to run it. That passed off peacefully so he drew trumps in two rounds then played the king of clubs off the table and had 12 tricks for +1430.

Jassem opened a three-way Polish Club, this time the strong artificial version, and his 2♦ rebid was an artificial game force. At his next turn he agreed spade and, after hearing two cuebids from Nowak, asked for key cards and bid the slam. Unalan too led a low diamond round to declarer's ten. Nowak led a club at trick two and when Unalan ducked he had lost his ace; 13 tricks for +1460 and 1 IMP to Poland.

The match ended in a 69-36 IMP win to Poland, 16.66-3.34 VPs. Sweden still had three boards to play and were ahead by 0.92 VPs. They would win the championship if they won their match by 49 or more IMPs, that is, did not concede more than 10 IMPs over those last three deals.

On Board 18, Sweden picked up 4 IMPs to lead by 63, defeating INT by one trick in one room and 2♠ by one trick in the other.

Board 19 was flat when the Swedish E/W pair went down one in 4♠ but Greece were also down in 3♠. So it all came down to the last deal, with Sweden having a 14 IMP cushion.

The natural auction saw East become declarer. They still, however, had to bid the slam, otherwise Sweden would survive by a single IMP. Katerina Kapayannides set trumps and, after cuebidding, asked for key cards then bid the slam. There was the usual diamond lead but it didn't matter. Michalis Sofios had no trouble in coming to 12 tricks for +1430 and 17 IMPs to Greece. Sweden still won the match, by 75-29 IMPs, but that meant only 18.23 VPs, and it wasn't quite enough.

What an incredible finish, and if the king of diamonds had been in the other hand it would all have been so different, with Swedish joy and Polish tears, instead of the actual Polish joy and Swedish tears.

Norway took bronze, while England finished fourth, Netherlands fifth and France sixth.

308 v Geely Automobile (Open Round 3)

For Round 3 we take a look at one of the favourites, China's Geely Automobile, up against the China Hong Kong Team 308.

There were moderate swings on each of the first four boards, after which Team 308 led by 10-3 IMPs.

I would love to be able to explain the first auction but I would be guessing about K.Y. Tam's 2♥ response as we don't have a file of all the systems at this tournament. After that, 3♠ was obviously the start of a minor-suit slam hunt and 4♣ stressed the long clubs. When Alan Tsang was unable to co-operate, Tam just jumped to the small slam. there were 13 top tricks so that was +940 to Team 308.

The Geely Auto auction is easier to understand. One Club was strong, 2♣ a natural positive, and the next few bids also natural. Four Hearts and 4♠ were cuebids and now Gan Xinli thought he knew enough to take control with RKCB. Five Clubs showed one key card, 5♦ asked about the queen, and the 5♥ response, promising both the club queen and heart king, was just what Xinli wanted to hear. Plus 1520 meant 11 IMPs to Geely Auto, who took the lead at 14-10.

Tam opened with a 3♣ pre-empt in third seat and Gui Shengyue overcalled. When Zhang Bangxiang converted to 3NT, wanting to give weight to his club holding despite the heart support, Tsang liked his heart holding over the overcall so doubled and Bangxiang knew that had to be based on a heart holding so did not run to 4♥

Knowing where the clubs were, Tam led the nine of spades. Tsang won the ace and switched to club so Tam cashed three of those and there were still two hearts to come for down two and -300.

Playing Precision, Shi Xiao had the option to open a level lower and did so. Charmian Koo doubled and Xinli redoubled to show strength then bid 2NT at his next turn and was left to play there. It is rarely right for the same team to declare 3NT and 2NT on the same deal and this time was no exception. Pearlle Chan led the two of hearts to the king and ace and declarer played a club to the jack then cashed the ace and was disappointed to see Koo show out. Xinli could do no better than to cash the king of clubs and switch his attention to diamonds, but there was no time to establish a trick in that suit so he was down two for -200 and 11 IMPs to Team 308, who moved back into the lead at 21-14.

Tam opened the West hand with a weak two bid while the suit quality was below Xiao's tolerance level when vulnerable so he did not, but the only difference was who became declarer in the N/S spade game.

Koo played 4♠ from the North hand on a low heart lead to the jack and ace. She cashed the ace of spades, getting the bad news, and continued with a heart to the king followed by the nine of clubs to her queen. When she continued with ace and a third club, Xinli ruffed in front of dummy with the nine and Koo over-ruffed with the king. She played a diamond to her ace followed by a fourth club but Xinli again ruffed in, this time with the ten. King and another diamond cashed the two defensive tricks in that suit and there was still another trump to come for down one and -100.

Tam too led a heart from the West hand and Bangxiang won in hand then played a spade to the ace. A spade back to the nine and king was followed by three rounds of clubs, Tsang discarding a diamond. Bangxiang ruffed, led a heart to the ace and led a fourth club, Tsang ruffing in with the ten as declarer pitched a diamond. Tsang returned a trump to dummy's bare queen and now the fifth club was played. Tsang ruffed in but it didn't matter - declarer was going to make either the club or his low spade as his game-going trick. Plus 620 gave Geely Auto 12 IMPs and the lead at 26-21.

It looks as though the key to making this contract was to win the opening lead with the king - winning with the ace left the North hand, for all its 21 HCP, short of a vital entry.

Geely Auto picked up a partscore swing on Board 12 to lead by 30-21, then the match ended with two sizable swings.

Xinli's strong club opening discouraged his opponents from competing and he was left to declare 2♥ after a transfer sequence over the INT rebid. Chan led a diamond to the jack and ace. Xinli led his low heart to the six and nine and back came the nine of spades, zero or two higher. He put in the jack and when that forced the ace was in good shape, Chan returned the king of clubs so he won and played the heart jack. Koo won that and returned a diamond but declarer could win in dummy and play a third round of hearts. When Koo won that and played the queen of spades rather than a club, Xinli had an overtrick for +140.

Tsang opened a strong no trump and Tam transferred to hearts. However, when 2♥ came back to Shengyue, he balanced with 2♠ and played there, finding a pretty nice dummy. Tsang cashed the ace of diamonds then switched to the jack of hearts. Shengyue won in hand and led the queen of spades to the king and ace then a second spade. With only one trump loser, he too had nine tricks for +140, and 7 IMPs to Geely Auto, up by 37-21.




Tam opened 2♣, strong and artificial, and Tsang responded 2♦, weak or waiting. Bangxiang decided to take some bidding space away from his opponents, who were presumably about to bid and make at least game, and Tam doubled for penalty, ending the auction.

Tam led a top heart, ruffed by Bangxiang, who led a diamond, dummy's ten winning when Tam played low. A second heart ruff was followed by a club, declarer guessing wrong by putting up the king and losing to the ace. Tsang returned a spade to his partner's ace and tam cashed the ace and king of trumps then played a winning heart. Bangxiang could come top only four trump tricks and the king of spades so was down four for –800. That would be OK if his team-mates could bid and make slam, but the bad breaks suggested that might be a bit of a challenge.

Sure enough, the Chinese E/W did get to slam, after a 2♥ opening from Xinli showing below opening vales with both majors. Xiao asked a few questions then jumped to slam. Chan led the queen of diamonds which, from declarer's perspective, did no immediate harm. He ruffed and continued with a diamond ruff, the six-one split being the first piece of bad news. Xinli tried the spade finesse but that lost and back came a spade to dummy's ace. He was allowed to ruff another diamond then played a heart to the ace followed by a fourth diamond. This time, Koo ruffed high and returned a trump to dummy's ten. Declarer played the queen of spades now fro a club pitch but Koo could ruff so the contract was down two for -100 and 14 IMPs to Team 308.

The final score was 37-35 in favour of Geely Automobile, or 10.66-9.34 VPs.

in Round 4 of the Open, Sung (Korea) met an Indonesian team, Pertamina DKI, which looked stronger than the one which represented the country in the recent APBF Championships in Bangkok and were expected to do well here in Hong Kong.

Pertamina started with a game swing on the very first board of the match.

Both Easts opened 4♠, as who would not, and neither South was tempted into an indiscretion at the five level.

Taufik Asbi cashed the ace of diamonds, took a look at dummy, and switched to the five of hearts. Moonsub Kim thought it would be easier for South to switch from the ace than from the queen when seeing those hearts in the dummy so put up the king, losing to the ace. Robert Tobing switched to a trump to dummy's bare ace. Kim played a low club so Tobing won the ace and, not being sure which red trick might be cashing, returned a club. Kim could only win that and try to cash another club winner for a heart discard, so Asbi got a ruff for one down and -50.

At the other table, Kyunghae Sung played two top diamonds. Franky Karwur ruffed and played a spade to the ace then a low club, winning his ten. He cashed five rounds of spades before playing a second club. Sungae Yang won and had a diamond to get off play with but now a heart up saw declarer get it right for ten tricks and +420; 10 IMPs to Pertamina.

Both Souths opened 1♥ and both Wests made the normal 4♠ overcall. When that came back to South, he had significant extra values and a spade shortage, but did he have sufficient to encourage partner to bid at the five level? Asbi was willing to take the chance of his partner bidding something unsuccessful, because he knew that only a very shapely hand would bid on, and Tobing repaid his trust by passing. Sung was not so sure and passed the borderline hand.

Both Norths led a heart in response to the opening bid and that meant that the defence had its fourth trick established while the diamonds were still blocked. Declarer had no chance after this lead and both were down one. That was -50 for Julius George but -100 for Myungkee Park, and another 2 IMPs to Pertamina.

Karwur started with a forcing INT response then jumped to the spade game at his next turn, showing game values but nothing special so not worth a slam try. Kim started with a two-over-one response and the club fit was found. He in turn showed his spade support but Park was uninterested in slam so just raised himself to game.

Yang led the eight of diamonds, third and fifth, to the nine and king, and Sung switched to a heart. George rose with the ace, drew trumps in four rounds and played a club to the jack and queen. Yang played king and another heart so George ruffed, took the diamond finesse, then played a second club. Out of hearts by this point, Sung had to give the last two tricks to dummy; down one for -100.

Clearly neither E/W pair play the style where to double then bid 2♦ over a 2♣ response just showed diamonds with four hearts, as opposed to a hand too strong for an immediate overcall. This 'equal level conversion' is a popular one in the UK, and is ideal for a hand like East's. Anyway, that was not a problem on this deal. The problem for the Korean team was that, where George drove to game with the West cards via a 2♠ cuebid, Park did not bid at all facing the overcall.

Yang led the nine of spades against 3NT. That was ducked to the ten and George in turn ducked a diamond. Sung won and returned a low club but there was only the ace of spades to come from here; +660.

Two Diamonds made ten tricks for an inadequate +130 and 11 IMPs to Pertamina, who led by 27-12.

Park opened at the one level and everybody got their bidding done at a comfortable level before Asbi was left to declare 2♥. That showed good discipline from Tobing, who could hardly have been thrilled at his partner's 2♥ bid and did have a sixth spade to tempt him to 'correct' to what he might have thought to be a better spot.

The lead was the king of clubs. Asbi won the ace and took a diamond pitch on the ace of spades then ruffed a spade to hand to play three rounds of hearts. Park won the third heart and played the queen of clubs. That set up declarer's nine and he had four hearts, a spade and two clubs for down one and -50.

George opened 2♣, natural with five-plus clubs and below 16 HCP. Yang made a perfectly normal overcall and Sung passed for now, knowing a misfit when he saw one. However, when George made a reopening double and Karwur left it in, Sung ran to 3♥, only to be doubled by George. Where Tobing had shown discipline at the other table, Yang did not. He 'corrected' to 3♠ and that received another penalty double, ending the auction.

Karwur led the singleton club to the jack, queen and ace, and yang played ace of spade followed by the jack, losing to George's queen. George cashed the king of clubs then played a suit-preference four to give Karwur a ruff. Back came a low diamond to the ace so he cashed the seven of clubs then continued with the six, ruffed and over-ruffed. Karwur had two diamonds and the king of spades to come for down five and -1100; 14 IMPs to Pertamina and a 41-12 IMP lead.

Kim opened the East hand then rebid his clubs facing the negative double and was left to play in a peaceful 2♣. Asbi led the four of diamonds and Kim ran it to Tobing's queen. Tobing switched to a spade and Asbi won and played a second round, ruffed. Kim cashed the top clubs then played on diamonds and lost two clubs and a heart; just making for +90.

Slightly surprisingly, Karwur did not open a Precision 2♣, preferring to pass when vulnerable. He came in with a 2♣ overcall at his next turn, however, then responded 2NT to George's competitive double. Karwur won the opening heart lead with dummy's king and cashed the top diamonds to see if the queen would fall. No luck there, so he switched his attention to clubs, leading low and putting in the ten when Yang did not split his honours. 

Kim opened 1♣ and Asbi overcalled 1♠ then jumped to game facing the support-promising cuebid. That left Park with no room to support clubs unless he was willing to commit to the five level opposite a hand that could double 2♣ to show a good suit. Not surprisingly at this vulnerability, he was unwilling to make that commitment. Five Clubs doubled would have cost -500.

Park led the nine of hearts. Asbi won the king and played on spades and had 12 tricks for +680. Karwur opened 2♣, Precision, and Sung doubled. When George jumped pre-emptively to 4♣, Tobing bid game in his four-card major and Karwur went on to 5♣. I am not sure that I would have bid 5♥ with the South cards, given that I am minimum in high-card terms and have only three hearts, but Sung did so and 5♥ ended the auction. Yang ruffed the club lead and played on spades. Karwur won the first spade and forced dummy to ruff a second club but declarer was in complete control. He cashed the ace of hearts, came back to hand with a diamond to the ace, then cashed the king and queen of hearts and simply played winners at Karwur, who could make only his boss trump; 11 tricks for +650 but 1 IMP to Pertamina, up by 42-19.



Sung opened a multi 2♦ and George passed as West then doubled for take-out when the pass or correct 2♥ response came back to him. Karwur responded 2♠, clearly understanding from their methods that the double was just a balancing effort and so was limited. This was a very good time to play such methods, as it turned out.

Sung led the jack of clubs. Karwur won the king and led a low heart towards the queen, Sung winning the ace and continuing with a second heart for his partner to ruff. Yang returned a diamond but Karwur put in the queen and led a spade to the ten, losing to the jack, won the diamonds return and discarded dummy's last diamond on a heart winner. Yang ruffed and returned a club but Karwur could win, cash the ace of spades and just lose one more trump trick for +110.

In the other room, Asbi too opened a multi and Park too made a delayed double. Here, however, the double was not limited, this being the way to deal with a hand short in hearts even with very good values. Accordingly, Kim cuebid, showing four spades plus a heart stopper and forcing to game. When his opponents bid to 4♠, Tobing looked at his excellent rump holding and doubled.

Tobing led his singleton heart so Asbi won and gave him a ruff. Park put in the queen on the diamond return then led a spade, getting the bad news. He put up the ace and led a club to the king then played a winning heart for a diamond pitch. Tobing ruffed and cashed the king and queen of spades but that was all; down two for –300 and 9 IMPs to Pertamina, 51-19.

Park raised hearts and Tobing doubled for take-out. Kim now made a very optimistic game try and Park quickly signed off. Asbi made the attacking lead of the king of diamonds, but this proved not to be the time for such enterprise. Kim won the ace and played ace of spades and ruffed one, a club to the ace and ruffed a second spade, then conceded a club. Asbi won that and returned a trump. Tobing won the ace and cashed the king of spades then played a diamond but declarer could win in dummy and ruff a club back to hand to play the jack of hearts, losing only to the king. Kim had nine tricks for +140.

George responded 1♠, the equivalent of a forcing no trump in his methods. Karwur's INT rebid showed spades and now George showed his heart support in a poor hand by going back to 2♥, ending the auction.

With no take-out double from his partner, sung was not tempted to make such an aggressive opening lead as at the other table and chose the four of hearts. Yang won and returned the suit so the defence began with three rounds of trumps and there were no ruffs to be had in the dummy. there was nothing Karwur could do and he came to just three trumps and three aces so was down two for –200 and 8 IMPs to Sung. They still trailed by 27-52 going into the final deal.



The final deal turned out to be a bloody affair when both Wests were willing to drive to three level with a Michaels Cuebid to get their shapely hand across. Facing a passed partner, both presumably did so as a pre-emptive measure, as they could hardly hope to be making anything at a high level with a hand containing no ace or king. Well, their opponents did have game on but nothing more, and the price was a lot more than the value of that game when the two N/Ss both did well by playing for a penalty. In both rooms, North started with a value-showing double, doubled $3\heartsuit$ for penalty and, when East gave reluctant preference to hearts, made a second penalty double.

Sung led his singleton diamond against $3\heartsuit$ doubled. That went to the ten and jack and Yang cashed the king of spades then played a top diamond, ruffed with the five and over-ruffed. Sung cashed the ace of spades then continued with another spade winner, ruffed low and over-ruffed with the king. Now Yang played back a heart so Sung won the ace and returned a club – why not a spade? That went to the king and ace with declarer discarding a diamond from dummy, and now Karwur played back the club eight and, when Sung failed to cover, pitched another diamond. The next club was covered and ruffed, and now Karwur exited with a diamond and came to two trumps at the end for down four and -800.

George/Karwur would have been concerned about their result on this deal, but they need not have been. In the other room, Asbi too led his singleton diamond and the eight was allowed to hold the trick. He switched to the ace of spades, dropping his partner's king, then gave Tobing a spade ruff. A club return went to the nine, queen and ruff, and Kim ruffed a diamond. Asbi over-ruffed and played a spade, ruffed low and over-ruffed with the king, and Tobing returned a top diamond, ruffed and over-ruffed. Asbi cashed the ace of hearts now then got out with the nine of spades and Kim ruffed. He played the queen of diamonds and Tobing could only cash the jack then concede the last two tricks to declarer, who was down five for -1100 and 7 IMPs to Pertamina.

The Indonesian team, Pertamina DKI, had won the match by 59-27 IMPs, 17.34-2.66 VPs, and topped their qualifying group after four rounds of play.



Dragon Piggies v Jilin Dingyuan (Open Round 5)

Round 5 of the Open featured a match between Dragon Piggies of China Hong Kong and Jilin Dingyuan of Jilin, China.

Dragon Piggies picked up 3 IMPs on the first board when they defeated partscores by one trick at each table for a pairs of +50s, and they picked up something rather more substantial on Board 2.

There are four top losers in a heart game, two diamonds and a trump trick, but that doesn't mean that it can never be made.

Leo Cheung had heard a diamond overcall from his partner, Chris Fung, so was not too hard pressed to find the killing diamond lead. Fung took two of those then switched to a spade. Liu Zhanxue overtook his jack with the king to lead a heart to the nine and ten, won the spade return and cashed the heart ace; down one for -100.

There had been diamond bids from West in the other room also, but He Wenjiong persuaded himself to lead the ten of spades instead, perhaps thinking that only one diamond was likely to stand up. The spade went to the queen and ace and Baron Ng cashed the jack, crossed to the ace of clubs and took a diamond pitch on the king of spades. When he saw the nine fall on his left, he continued with the spade eight and three his remaining diamond. Wenjiong ruffed and gave his partner a club ruff, but there was just one more trump trick for the defence; ten tricks for +620 and 12 IMPs to Dragon Piggies, ahead by 15-0.

Jilin Dingyuan had clawed back 4 IMPs over the course of the next five boards to close to 4-15. Then they pulled a lot closer on this next deal.

Zhanxue contented himself with a simple overcall of 2♦ then repeated the suit at his next turn. He would have been happy to hear his partner compete with 5♦ over 4♠, but Cheung was unwilling to defend when looking at a diamond void so 5♦ did not buy the contract, it merely pushed E/W up to an uncomfortably high level. However, 5♠ was fated to succeed on any lead and, when Zhanxue led a top diamond, Fung ruffed. He could have made all the tricks from here but played a low heart off the dummy at trick two. Zhang went in with the king and led a trump so Fung won, drew the missing trumps and took a club finesse. When the clubs came in without loss, he had 12 tricks for +480.

Ng made a jump cuebid, asking for a spade stopper. When Wenjiong raised to 4♠, Tony Lau doubled, ending the auction. Zhanjie ruffed the diamond lead and came to hand with a trump to play a club to the queen. He continued by cashing the ace and, when the suit divided evenly, could draw the rest of the trumps and cash all 13 tricks for +890 and 9 IMPs to Jilin Dingyuan; 13-15.

Zhanxue opened 2NT and showed his five-card suit in response to Puppet Stayman. Cheung led the seven of hearts against 3NT and that ran to declarer's ten. Zhanxue ducked a spade at trick two, losing to the jack, and back came a heart to his king. He cashed two top spades, discovering the bad break, so next crossed to dummy with a diamond to lead a club up. The seven went to the ten, jack and queen, and back came a club to the ace. Zhanxue had nine tricks now for +400.

Ng opened a multi then described his balanced hand with spades. Wenjiong made the fourth-best diamond lead of the seven to the jack and king, and Ng cashed the king of hearts, then ducked a spade. Back came the ten of diamonds, overtaken with the queen and ducked. Wenjiong continued with another diamond to dummy's ace and Zhanjie threw the ten of clubs and Ng his low club. Ng led a heart to the ten, cashed the ace of hearts and two top spades then, seeing that he was a trick short, led the jack of clubs from hand and when the ace appeared had nine tricks for +400 and a flat board, but Ng had been forced to work hard after the diamond lead.

Zhang opened a weak two bid and Fung overcalled 3NT, where he played. the ten of spades went to the queen and duck, and Zhang switched to the nine of hearts. Fung went up with the ace and cashed the top diamonds, getting some very good news for a change. He continued with a third diamond to dummy, took the marked spade finesse, cashed the ace of spades and fourth diamond, then ran the queen of clubs to Zhanxue's king. The nine of clubs return was covered by ten, jack and ace, and the eight of clubs was the ninth trick; +600.

Lau did not open the South hand and Ng made a transfer overcall of Zhenjie's strong club opening. Zhenjie was soon declaring 3NT, against which ng led the ten of hearts round to his queen.

Declarer played ace of clubs then a low club to the ten, losing to the jack. The hearts were cleared and now declarer cashed the top diamonds then, when the queen and jack fell, two more diamonds. Finally, he led a spade off the table but, when Lau did not split, went up with the ace and had only eight tricks for down one and -100; 12 IMPs to Dragon Piggies, who led by 27-13.



Lau opened 3♠, which looks too little to me when you think what a non-vulnerable pre-empt could be based on. However, when Zhanjie was unwilling to make a take-out double on an 11-count, despite having the spade shortage, Lau bought the contract. Zhanjie led the six of diamonds, ducked to the eight and jack, and Lau could draw trumps and claim nine tricks for an excellent +140.

Zhang agreed with me that the South hand was not a 3♠ bid and opened 1♠ instead – anyone for 4♠? fung had no trouble in finding a take-out double at this level and Cheung cuebid in response then bid 4♥ when Zhang's 3♠ came back to him. Zhang cashed a top spade then played a second round but Cheung could ruff high in dummy, play a heart to the ace, cash the ace of clubs and take a second high spade ruff before pitching the last spade on the king of clubs. there were two diamonds to lose from here but that meant ten tricks for +420 and 11 IMPs to Dragon Piggies.

The final result was 38-19 in favour of Dragon Piggies, or 15.06-4.94 VPs



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
