Ping An Ladies (China) completed their victory over JADU (Seoul/Tokyo) yesterday, the final result being 126-82 IMPs. The winning team is: Yiyi Liang, Irene Ho, Fu Cheung, Shi Shaomin, Wu Yu, Wen Jing, and npc Yafu Lin.

Beijing High School (Associated to Remin University of China) won the Youth teams, comfortably defeating Hong Kong Youth in the final by 180 -100 IMPs. The winning team is: Cheng Zhiyu, Shen Jiahe, Fang Dongke, Wang Zihan, Jiang Baozhuo, Pan Yale, and npc Jiang Tong.

Open Round 9 – Zen v GZ Pearl River

The top two in Open Group B met in the final round of qualifying with both assured of going through to the knockout stages. Zen went into the match ahead of Guangzhou Pearl River, but came out of the match well behind, as the Chinese team dominated the match, winning by 69-22 IMPs, 18,87-1.13 VPs. This was the biggest swing in favour of GZ Pearl River.



The Zen East/West had a long and descriptive auction, during which Tony Lau showed his heart/club two-suiter, two key cards but no trump queen. Xiaoguang Yang led a trump. Lau took two round sof those then took the club finesse for a quick one down; -100.

The GZ Pearl River East/West bid in a less sophisticated manner, Jianke Luo simply asking for key cards facing a limited opening bid of 1♥ then bidding the small slam and giving his opponent a blind lead. Derek Zen cashed the ace of spades and switched to a diamond. Yongchuan Li rose with the ace and cashed all the trumps then the spades. Dummy held the queen of diamonds and a club, so Zen was forced to bare his club king to keep the diamond guard. Samuel Wan did the best he could to protect his partner's holding, coming down to jack-six of clubs and following with the jack when Li led dummy's club up at trick twelve. But Wan's best wasn't good enough, as Li went up with the ace, dropping the bare king offside and making his contract for +1430 and 17 big IMPs to GZ Pearl River.



Open Semi-final 2 – Ping An v Slam Hunter

After the first of three semi-final sessions, Ping An (Shenzhen) led Slam Hunter (Singapore/Hong Kong) by 45-28 IMPs. Their advantage had increased slightly, at 57-37, when this deal came along:

Shen could open 2♠, weak two-suiter with spades and a minor, and Cheung overcalled. Now Shi simply jumped to 5♦, having no real idea who was making what but wanting the leave his opponents with the last guess. They guessed to stay silent so he declared 5♦, where he lost two trump tricks plus one trick in each black suit; down two for –200.

Lau opened the North hand at the one level, choosing the major over his longer clubs. This left more room for East/West to do their bidding but Wong was hardly going to let them play the heart game when he was looking at an eight-card suit. He bid 4NT over 4♥ and seems to have misinterpreted the 5♣ response. It looks as though Shen was showing his second suit but 5♣ was taken as a third step response to Key-card (third step because pass and redouble were available after West's double). It is difficult to find any other explanation for the jump to 6♦, but Yafu Lin wasn't

complaining and he doubled, to end the auction. Shi too lost four tricks but that cost him –800 and 12 IMPs went the way of Ping An.

On Board 21, Wong and Shi both faced a INT opening holding:

Wong passed and INT was down two for –200. Shi gambled a little and used Stayman then passed the 2♠ response. The four-four fit made eight tricks for +110 and 7 IMPs to Ping An. An overtrick IMP on the next deal saw the lead up to 40 at 77-37, but then Slam Hunters hit back.

Playing strong club, Lin had to open the West hand with 1♣. He showed his long suit over Wang's natural positive response and Wang closed proceedings with 3NT. That put the five-card spade suit on lead and Wong led the seven. Wang ducked the first spade but had to win the second. He cashed the diamonds then, knowing that spades were five-three so that setting up a heart trick would lead to down one, ran the jack of clubs in hope of finding a ninth trick in that suit without having to give up the lead. It was not to be. The losing club finesse meant that the contract was two down for -200.

Fung could open 1NT and Cheung raised directly to game. with no stand out lead, Shi tried the jack of diamonds. That did not disturb Fung unduly. He won the king and played clubs from the top, coming to eleven tricks – five in each minor plus the ace of spades – for +660 and 13 IMPs to Slam Hunters, who needed them.

Lin opened 3♣ as West and Lau passed, content to collect fifties if partner could not reopen. When Wong balanced with 3♦, Lau bid 3NT and played there. Wang tried a low spade lead, which ran to Lau's jack. He ducked the nine of diamonds to Lin's ten and Lin returned the queen of hearts. Lau won the king and played three rounds of diamonds, pitching hearts from hand. Wang won the last diamond and returned a heart for the jack and ace so Lau cashed the heart ten then

played the queen of spades and Wang could win and cash a heart but then had to give the remaining tricks to dummy; +400.

Fung also opened 3♣ but Shen made an aggressive overcall of 3NT and, looking at 10 HCP and a long suit, Shi made a slam try – swiftly declined by Shen. Cheung too led a low spade. Shen won and ran the nine of diamonds and back came the four of hearts. Shen won the ace and played the queen of spades. Cheung won and cleared the spades and now Shen won and led a club up, Fung grabbing his ace and returning a heart, then tried to split the diamonds. When diamonds did not behave as hoped, Shen led a club to the ten and jack then cashed the king. He was two down for 100 and 11 IMPs to Slam Hunters, back in the match at 60-77.

Cheung did not like to open with a weak two bid when holding a weak suit in a two-suiter so passed, and now Shi could open another of those weak two-suited bids, quickly raised to game by Shen. Four Spades might have been a tricky contract, but not on Fung's defence. He cashed the ace of spades, took a look at dummy and switched to the king of diamonds. Now there was just one loser in each minor and the contract made exactly for +620.

Wang was willing to open the East hand, with a multi. Lin inquired and raised to game on finding his partner with hearts. Wong led a club but it didn't matter. There were just three top losers and that was all; another +620 and 15 IMPs to Ping An.

Cheung opened 1♦ but passed over the weak jump overcall. He admitted to heart support when Fung reopened with a double and Fung raised himself to game. Perhaps Fung could have done more but he suspected that he was facing a weak no trump type, had a dubious value in the queen of spades, and had no reason to suspect that there were five running diamond tricks. Shen led his diamond. Fung won, drew trumps and had twelve tricks for +480.

Wang could open INT, 13-15. Lin used forcing Stayman, heard of the five-card diamond suit, and introduced his own five-card suit. On finding heart support, he simply jumped to the small slam, which seems a bit wild but was eminently successful; +980 and 11 IMPs to Ping An.

The Shenzhen team led by 105-64 with one set to play and had one foot in the final.

Triple Squeeze

Today's deal from the Las Vegas Nationals shows how dangerous it can be to double a world champion. At the other table 3NT was not doubled and neither was it made, despite declarer being a well-known US pro-player. After a heart lead, declarer simply played for split diamond honours and was down one.

We reached this thin game on the auction above, East doubling the final contract as, after all, his partner had responded to his opening bid.

West led the eight of hearts to the queen and Nevena won the ace and played a diamond to the jack and king. Back came the ten of hearts. She won the jack and cashed all four spades, discarding a diamond from the dummy. East had discarded two clubs on the second and third rounds of spades, but what could he do on the last spade? He had been triple squeezed and was forced to throw one of his heart winners, after which declarer could knock out the second diamond honour and, with only two hearts left to cash, East could no longer defeat the contract; +750 and 13 IMPs to the good guys.

Open Quarter-final – Ambassador v Geely Automobile

Set One

After seven boards of their Open quarter-final, Ambassador led Geely Automobile by 7-6 IMPs. The lead changed hands on Board 8 when Wang/Gang, for Geely Auto, bid to a good slam, missed by Gui/Dai for Ambassador.

Everything seemed to go very smoothly after Rui Wang's strong club opening. Two Diamonds showed five plus diamonds and 8+ HCP and, when Xinli Gang showed spades at his second turn, they were off to the races. Wang agreed spades and Gang cuebid but then, looking at weak trumps, was unwilling to go past game. Wang, however, had both good trumps and good controls and went on, checking on key cards then bidding the small slam when Gang showed one. C.C. Mok led the ten of clubs. Gang put up the ace and pitched his second club on the heart king. Next he played the king of spades, won by L.H. Chin, who returned his remaining spade. Gang won, drew the last outstanding trump and claimed; +980.

John Tsang opened with a natural 1♥ in the other room and splintered to show his excellent hand in support of spades at his next turn. However, that didn't suit Jim Lee at all, looking as he was at no side-suit honour outside diamonds and a ten-high trump suit. He signed off in game, seeing no safety at the five level, and Tsang respected his decision; +480 but 11 IMPs to Geely Auto.

Lee and Tsang bid a thin game on the next deal, missed at the other table, so pulled back 7 IMPs, then their team-mates bid a slam on Board 10.

When Chin reversed into hearts, Mok effectively drove to the club slam, no doubt hoping to find partner with a little more high-card strength than was actually the case. Gang led the ten of spades and Chin won the ace, pitching a heart from hand. He had the option of pitching a diamond and trying to ruff all three heart losers in the dummy, but that line is not quite as attractive as it might at first appear – as it means playing ace then nine of clubs

from hand, it runs the risk of the club king being with North and the seven with South and a possible trump promotion, as well as a possible diamond ruff. Chin led a heart to his ace and ruffed a heart, a diamond to the king and took a second heart ruff. Next he passed the club queen to the king, ruffed the spade return and drew trumps then tried to split the diamonds. When diamonds duly behaved as required, Chin had twelve tricks for +1370.

Shengyue Gui did not reverse in the other room, preferring to rebid the clubs rather than overstate the strength of his hand. Slam was never really in the picture and Jianming Dai eventually jumped to the club game. Gui won the heart lead and ruffed a heart, led a diamond to the king and ruffed a second heart. He threw a diamond on the spade ace then ruffed a spade and ruffed his last heart. Next he came back to hand with a diamond and, strangely, played a third diamond without touching trumps. Lee, who had pitched a diamond on the fourth heart, could ruff this but it was only the overtrick, declarer just losing one more trump trick; +600 but 13 IMPs to Ambassador.

The score had moved onto 37-18 in favour of Ambassador as we approached the half-way point in the match, but there were still swings to come on the last two boards of the set.

The auctions were identical up to South's second bid but then the paths diverged.

Mok raised to 3NT and Wang was not excited by the two low and four low in partner's suits so chose to defend. Gang led a low spade to dummy's ten and Chin crossed to hand in clubs to lead a diamond to the queen and king. A spade back cleared the suit and Chin could do no better than cash his clubs and settle for down two and -100.

Dai did not raise to 3NT, but Tsang did raise to 4♥. When that came around to Dai he thought it likely to be successful so tried 4NT, a minor-suit take-out. Gui was happy to choose 5♣, but Tsang was equally happy to double him, ending the auction. Lee cashed the ace of hearts and, not having an attractive alternative, continued with a small heart. That worked out just fine as Gui ruffed and called for dummy's diamond queen. Lee won the ace and played the queen of hearts, forcing dummy to ruff for a second time. Gui played the nine of clubs to his ace to play a diamond up, but that left an awkward blockage in the trump suit. The jack of diamonds lost to the king and Tsang returned a spade to the jack and ace. Gui played back the ten of spades to Lee's king and a third spade ensured a trump trick for North; down three for -500 and 9 IMPs to Ambassador. The consolation for Dai was that he was correct, 4♥ probably would have been made had he left his opponents in peace.

When East repeated his spades, guaranteeing six of the suit, both Wests knew that they were standing in a hole, holding a shovel. Mok knew that, more often than not, digging just makes the hole deeper. He passed and 2♠ drifted two down for -200. Dai was more optimistic, thinking that, sometimes, that shovel can dig you out of trouble. He tried 3♦ and must have been charmed with the dummy. He made ten tricks for +130 and 8 IMPs to Geely Auto.

After sixteen boards it was 46-26 in favour of Ambassador.

Set Two

Both East/West pairs started the second half well by bidding and making a good slam; no swing. Board 18 was also flat, a failing partscore at both tables. Then came a major swing, after which the match was a whole lot tighter.

Gang's 2♦ response was a transfer, showing a better hand than a simple raise to 2♥. It didn't matter, however, with both Wests raising themselves to game.

Both Norths led the king of clubs. Lee ruffed in hand and led a heart to the king then low to the jack and ace and a third round to the ten and queen. Lixin Yang returned his spade to the king and ace and Dai gave him his ruff. With a diamond still to be lost, Lee was down one for -100.

Rui Wang won the club lead with the ace, discarding a diamond from hand, and played the king of hearts followed by a low heart to the queen and ace. Again, a third heart went to the ten and jack, and again South returned his spade. But Wang put in the spade queen and Chin failed to give the ruff, instead switching to a diamond. Wang won, drew the missing trump and claimed ten tricks for +620 and 12 IMPs to Geely Auto.

Eighteen more IMPs, gathered with modest swings over the next four boards, meant that Geely Auto had moved into a 56-46 IMP lead with nine boards to play. Then Ambassador struck back.

Wang opened INT and Gang showed his two-suiter, bidding first diamonds then hearts. When 4♥ was bid on his right, Mok knew that Wang was about to give preference to diamonds so, not knowing how many tricks his opponents could come to but suspecting that it might be quite a lot, he took the advance save in 6♣, doubled by Wang to end the auction. Gang cashed the ace of diamonds then underled in hearts, Wang winning and cashing a second heart before reverting to diamonds to force dummy to ruff. That ensured that there would also be a trump loser so the contract was down three for -500, a good save with 5♦ cold for East/West.

Lee's 1♦ opening at the other table was great news for Tsang, who first cuebid to show a constructive diamond raise then went on with 4♥, and was not put off by Lee's sign-off. He raised to 6♦ and the Ambassador pair were in slam off two cashing tricks. Well, perhaps there is a case for North cashing the ace of spades, but dummy's heart suit had not really been shown in the auction and Dai chose to lead the jack of that suit. This did not, as they say, exactly paralyze declarer. Lee could win, draw trumps and take three spade discards on the heart winners; +920 and 9 IMPs to Ambassador, who needed them to change the momentum of the match, when it might have been 12 the other way on a spade lead and continuation. Geely Auto led by a single IMP at 56-55.

Board 25 saw both North/South pairs bid to an excellent 6♥, which failed when the four missing trumps were all offside so that there were two losers and down one. The next few boards showed that the momentum in the match had not been altered by Ambassador's fortunate slam on Board 24.



After Mok's 1♣ opening and Chin's pre-emptive raise, it was clear to Wang that the opposition were saving. With partner having bid 4♥ after passing as dealer, there was no reason to be confident of making eleven tricks, so double was the indicated action. Wang led the king of hearts against 5♣ doubled. Gang overtook to lead a spade through and the spade ruff meant down two for -500.

Yang's Precision 2♣ allowed Dai to pre-empt at a much higher level and he caught Tsang with too much distribution to pass. Five Hearts would have been OK, except that Yang had a singleton diamond and led it, collecting a ruff. The club winner was the setting trick; down one for -100 and 12 IMPs to Geely Auto.

Chin/Mok got to game via four-card Drury, Dai/Yang via a constructive raise cuebid after Tsang's overcall.

Tsang led the ace of spades and that gave the contract. He continued with a second spade to Dai's king. A club up established a pitch for declarer's third spade, Tsang winning his ace and returning a diamond. Dai led a heart to the ace, took his discard on the king of clubs, and led a second heart; +420.

Gang also led ace and another spade. Chin won the king and took the heart finesse. Wang won and cashed the spade and the contract was one down for 50 and 10 IMPs to Geely Auto.

It was tougher for Chin without the 2♣ overcall, but there was no hurry to play on trumps. A club at trick three looks like a free shot and, as here where there is no guess, makes the contract.

Facing the 13-15 no trump opening, Yang contented himself with a combination which showed five spades in an unbalanced mildly invitational hand. With a doubleton spade, Dai was not interested and passed 2♠. Lee led a heart round to declarer's ten. Yang led a spade to the king and a spade back to Tsang's queen. From here he just had to lose a diamond and two more spade tricks; +140.

Mok, suspecting that his side was down in the match, followed an invitational sequence at the other table and Dai went on to game. Wang doubled because the opposition had only scraped into game and the spades looked to be badly placed for declarer. Gang led the queen of spades, taking the double as lead-directing, and that ran to the king. Mok led a heart to his ten then ran the queen of diamonds and, when the ten dropped, continued with the jack, hoping for ten-nine doubleton. This time, Wang covered, so Mok won the ace and had nowhere to go for tricks. He played a spade to the nine, ten and jack, won the club lead with his bare ace and seems to have lost track of the spade and diamond spots as he next played the eight of diamonds rather than the eight of spades. Wang could cash three diamonds and a spade then play a club through and, as a club

had been thrown from dummy, Gang had the last three tricks for down three and -800; 14 IMPs to Geely Auto.

Chin opened with a strong and artificial 2♣ then bid and rebid his strong spades. When Mok showed hearts, a diamond feature, and spade tolerance, Chin jumped to slam. Six Spades is better than just bringing in the spades without loss as, even if there are jack-to-four spades in one hand, the hearts may ruff out to provide a second club discard. On the actual layout, spades behave but hearts do not ruff out, so there are twelve tricks and +980.

Dai opened a strong club and 1♥ was a natural positive. Dai bid his spades three times before reluctantly accepting that Yang was never going to co-operate and passed 3NT. There were the same twelve top tricks in no trumps so Yang scored +490 and Ambassador had 10 IMPs.

Those IMPs were too little too late, and Geely Automobile were through to the semi-finals, by a margin of 32 IMPs, 97-65.


