1. The minutes of the last meeting was read and adopted.

2. Matters Arising from Minutes of the Last Meeting

- -- SS advised that there are some technical difficulties in the existing computer scoring programme. Thus, there is no need to order new pick-up slips.
- -- The senior management of Regal Kowloon Hotel has also declined to provide free meal coupons.
- -- Tournament Operation Sub-committee has not yet issued the reminders to those failing to show up in the second session of Ladder Pairs Qualifying (after playing the first session) and warning letter to the mis-behaved player in a pairs event. The warning letter, with name withheld, will be published in Bridgzette later. Besides, a letter explaining the proper procedures to be observed for the player who used foul language in the recent IMP Pairs event has not yet been issued. Furthermore, warning letters have to be sent to two players whose attitude towards the game of bridge was grossly improper, as reflected by their behaviour in the recent Ladder Pairs A event.
- -- CC has not yet collected the entry fee from the Ladies Team that will take part in the World Team Olympiad in Greece.
- Regarding the absence of director in a Friday duplicate pairs event in Little Flower Club, DZ will send letters to Amy Yeung, the complaintant, and to the editor of the Bridge column in SCMP explaining the incident. These letters will be published in Bridgzette later.

-- SS has not yet drafted an article for publication in Bridgzette re-emphasizing the importance of properly filled-up convention cards.

-- Both teams representing Hong Kong in the Guangzhou/HK/Macau Interport have been informed of the change in dates.

-- AC has finalised the scheduling of apprentice directors from September to December

-- SS has not yet issued warning letter to a player who walked out in the middle of a recent Paul Jones Pairs event. This letter will be published in Bridgzette later.

-- SS has not yet obtained a report from C.C. Wong, the responsible director of the Inter-city Trial, on the incident where a player was found to have wrongly claimed hand and made remark before the bidding ended. If this was the case, SS will issue warning letter to this player. This warning letter will be published in Bridgzette later.

-- As there are a number of reminders/warning letters not yet issued by the Tournament Operations Sub-Committee, AC and DZ will now be responsible for their prompt issuance.

-- SS has received HK\$1,000 from Samuel Wan for 60 sets of playing cards sold.

3. Progress on Intercity 1996

Sponsorship and advertisement totalling HK\$221,500 have been solicited. A small surplus is expected. Canon has agreed to provide 2 copiers during the event free of charge.

30 overseas teams have submitted their entries. Together with 8 local teams qualified from the Trial and 2 local Ladies teams, there are 40 teams in total. Some overseas players are making up one more team. To allow more late entries from overseas while assuring a smooth running of the tournament, it was resolved that the 9th placed team of the Trial and 2 or 3 extra local teams will be accepted on the condition that altogether, there will be 44 teams confirmed before 17/8/1996.

More than 350 room nights have already been booked by the participants, surpassing our guaranteed figure to Kowloon Regal Hotel.

HK\$150,000 deposit has been paid to Regal Riverside Rotel, Shatin to confirm our booking from 8/5/1997 to 18/5/1997. The preliminary room rate will be HK\$1,200 nett. The package costing HK\$400,000 will include a welcome lunch, a victory dinner (but not the Delegates' Dinner) and the rental for the function rooms.

It was resolved that the Trial will be completed before 31/1/1997. The Open and Ladies representatives will be selected on team basis while that for Youth will be on pair basis. Neither subsidy nor incentive will be provided by the Association to the eventual representatives. However, the Association will be responsible for their tournament fee (except side games).

Entry fees for the Trial are HK\$3,000 per team (for Open and Ladies) and HK\$100 per pair (for Youth). JM will be responsible for the Youth team selection. Deadline for submission of entries will be 1/11/1996 (Friday). Details of the Trial will be announced in the September issue of Bridgzette.

4. Revised Tournament Schedule from 8/1996 to 12/1996

SS has revised the tournament schedule from August to December. However, the Wixed Pairs event has to be re-scheduled since the Olympiad Ladies Team will be in Greece at that time. The editor of SCMP's bridge column has been informed of the changes. The same will be announced during regular tournaments.

Questionnaire to Members

The revised questionnaire prepared by AL and DZ was tabled for discussion. For ease of the subsequent analysis, more multiple choices should be used. As such, the questionnaire will be re-drafted.

6. Proposal to AIA on Sponsorship for Organising Student Bridge Activities

7. Incident at III PABF Congress, Macau

Ricky Chu has submitted a further investigation report after contacting Simon Hui. It was resolved that the conclusion drawn up by Ricky Chu was adopted, i.e. the allegation was not substantiated. DZ will advise Simon Hui our opinion and copy to Macau Contract Bridge Association and Nelson Hsi. This letter. together with Simon Hui's initial complaint letter, will be published in Bridgzette later. Members who would like to have a look of Ricky Chu's reports are welcome to contact the Honourary Secretary.

8. Open League - Unannounced Absence of Tom Wong's Team

SS was unable to obtain explanation and apology from the team captain, Tom Wong, since the latter is still in Singapore. Further disciplinary action against Tom Wong's Team will be decided later.

9. Ladderette Team 4 & 5 - Letter from Chris Chung

The report submitted by the Chairman of the Ad-hoc Committee, AL. was tabled for discussion. According to Laws of Duplicate Contract Bridge, an appeal when properly lodged, is always an appeal. As such, it was resolved that the appeal will be adjudicated by the Appeals Committee before Ladderette 6 begins. In any case, Ladderette 5's results will count. Should the appeal be successful, there will not be any question on Ladderette 5's results. However, if this appeal is not successful, not only Ladderette 4's results will be adjusted, but the results of Ashley Lung's Team in Ladderette 5 must also be adjusted to not more than what the first placed team in Ladderette B can score.

In view of the significant error made by the responsible supervising director, SS, in this incident, it was resolved that for 6 months beginning 1/9/1996, SS has to take charge of at least 2 tournaments each month under the supervision of a qualified director. If his performance is satisfactory, he will then resume his status as qualified director.

10. A.O.B.

- a. The Filipino maid working at the Little Flower Club advised SS that the club may close after end of August since it was running at a loss. It was resolved that DZ will negotiate with the management of the club whether they would allow us to run tournaments there without stationing any of their staff.
- b.CY advised that from the coming issue of Bridgzette onwards, photos can be put on. Members can submit relative photos together with their articles for publication in Bridgzette.
- c. Christine Booth, one of the Ladies Team members participating in the coming World Team Olympiad in Greece, asked the council to re-consider shouldering their entry fee since they are monetheless representing Hong Kong in this event. It was resolved that since no Ladies team entry was received before the deadline, i.e. 31/1/1996, the Association was prepared not to send any Ladies team to the World Team Olympiad. Before allowing their team to take part in this event, the council had resolved not to provide any subsidy to them and they had to be responsible for the entry fee. Paragraph 7 of the minutes of the second council meeting refers.
- d. AC advised that the Tournament Operation Sub-committee has since decided to dispose those bidding boxes with hanging clips after 31/10/1996. St will include this message in the coming announcement to members.

The Mixed Pairs event has been re-scheduled from 29/10/1996 to 29/11/1996 so that members of the Ladies team may play in this tournament after they come back from World Team Olympiad in Greece. SW will include this change in tournament schedule in the coming announcement to members.

-- DZ advised that the management of the Little Flower Club has since decided to continue running the club and to make available the premises for our booking.

3. Progress on Intercity 1996

44 teams played in the Open Team event which was consisted of 4 sections. On the other hand, 60 pairs attended the IMP Pairs while 102 pairs turned up for the Open Pairs. 40 teams took part in the Swiss Team on the last day of the event. Computer dealt hands were welcome because players could have hand records for discussion purposes. The barometer format used in the Open Pairs Qualifying round enhanced fairness to all players who played the same set of hands. Some overseas players were very satisfied with the helpfulness of the secretarial staff of the organising committee.

The accounts have not yet been finalised but there should be a surplus of about ${\tt EK$100,000}$.

As far as the running of the tournament is concerned, since the programme only allowed one user to input scores and it was very time consuming to check out errors the players made when filling in the pick-up slips, there was a huge backlog of scores after the first few rounds, seriously delaying the publication of results and datum. It was suggested that the programme be revised to expedite the correct input of scores and it should accommodate multi-terminal input. Besides, the curtain cards have to be re-designed for the proper recording of hands.

The details of the entire event has been properly documented in floppy disks.

Progress on PARF Championship 1997

AC was elected as Chairman of the Organising Committee. 中的工行线衔 has shown interests in being the major sponsor of the event. On the other hand, Smartone will be one of the co-sponsors while Hewlett Packard may provide the necessary computer equipment for the tournament. Screens may either be borrowed from the China Bridge Association (freight costs: about HK\$8,000) or made with stylofoam locally at about HK\$100 each. Altogether, 50 screens are needed for the tournament.

The VU graph programme used in Bermuda Bowl held in Beijing last year will be adopted and subject to WBF's approval, the matches on VU graph will be broadcasted on Internet.

a. The Butler Club at Cityplaza, Taikooshing requested the Association to appoint

someone to teach their bridge class. SK will follow up on this.

b. Members have requested the Association to clarify whether Chin Lok Hang is a qualified director or not. AC will clarify this with Raymond Leung since the latter was responsible for director training last year. Besides, Lisa Lam and Raymond Mak have to pass the final examination set by AC before becoming
qualified directors. On the other hand, Chris Fung and Chow Ka Yan have just started their apprenticeship programme.

- c. For 2 consecutive years, players did not show up after qualifying for the Open Pairs Final. To allow sufficient time for proper registration for the final session and to look for replacement in case of need, it was resolved that starting from next year, for any event with 2-session qualifying round, the second session will be scheduled on Tuesday. The results will be ready Thursday morning and those who qualified for the final session scheduled on weekend must pay entry fee before the end of the tournament on Friday.
- d. A certain youth player from one of the tertiary institutions verbally requested SW to clarify whether the Inter-Post Secondary Bridge Association can nominate the overall winner of their Pairs League as members of the Youth team representing Hong Kong in the PABF Championship 1997. The council will discuss this after receiving their formal inquiry letter.
- e. Fatana Waller has withdrawn from the Ladies team participating in World Team Olympiad in Greece because she thought she is not up to the standard of the competition. It was resolved that Ella Graca will replace her but a warning letter will be issued to Fatana Waller.

11. Date of Next Meeting

The next council meeting will be held in the conference room of Room 1902. Tower 6, China Hong Kong City on 14/10/1996.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:20 p.m.

Re: Incident in III PABF Congress, Macau

On behalf of the Council, I am writing this letter in reply to your letter of May 27, 1996 on the captioned.

I must apologize for the time it has taken us to reply to your letter. In between this time, we had written to the Captain of Hong Kong team requesting an explanation (copy enclosed). We had also asked one of our members to conduct a thorough investigation and prepare a report (copy attached). The full Council then spent no less than 3 hours in going through and discussing this matter at the last two Council meetings. In sum, we recognize that this is a serious matter and had to be dealt with thoroughly, with a view that a fair and equitable decision can be made.

The finding of the report is summarised as follows:

"...it is safe to conclude that Hsi had not talked to Hui in length face to face. Those alleged insulting remarks were most likely made after Hsi walked away from Hui. It is more likely than not the Hsi felt more aggrieved when he walked away as his query was unanswered. Yet there is no evidence that he had shouted or used any indiscreet words directly against Hui or anybody. ... In all probability Hsi was 'downloading' his grievance by swearing in Shanghaiese which is his native dialect. Words and gestures are capable to be misinterpreted or exaggerated especially when the users were not in a particular harmonious relationship with each. It is therefore concluded that the allegations against are unsubstantiated."

Although we do not think that Hsi had any intention to insult anybody or organisation, however if the action of Mr. Hsi did give you the impression of being offended, please accept the Council's apology on behalf of our members. Unless you have objection, we intend to publish this incident in our Bridgzette and hopefully this can remind all our members that "Bridge should be a friendly game, words and gestures are capable to be misinterpreted, and indiscreet behavior can do nothing but undermine the healthy development of the game".

I must first apologize for the time it took me to reply to your letter of April 23, 1996.

You wrote and complained that no Director was arranged on April 19, 1996 and felt that members' interest was being ignored.

The matter was discussed in the Council meeting and the Mr. S. S. Bux (Chairman of Tournament Operating Committee) explained that on April 18, 1996, the original assigned Director called S.S. up and informed S.S. that he won't be able to direct on April 19, on the same night (12:00 p.m.) S.S. made a last minute try and call up Mr. Chow Fu Him (knowing that Mr. Chow will play next day) asking Chow to direct, and over the phone Chow agreed. Apparently Bux must had waken Chow halfway in his sleep so the conversation was never imprinted vividly on Chow memory, likewise, S.S. also didn't reconfirm with Chow on April 19, which ended up in a case of things almost but not quite firmly arranged.

As a mean to improve on communication to avoid re-occurrence in future, Council had asked S.S. to serve written notices to Directors detailing the dates of tournaments they are responsible. Directors were also requested to inform S.S. preferably few days in advance if they can't make it on certain tournaments.

I hope you will be happy with the reply and please accept my apology once again in this late reply.

第三屆 Generali 橋牌大師個人賽 The 3rd Generali Individual Masters Tournament.

光 由Generali(保險)集團贊助的第三屆大師個人審,已於96年5月30日在 法國巴黎結束.公開組(實際是男子組)共52人參加;女子組28人.比賽方 法是每一名選手要和其他所有選手輪流做一次搭檔,即男子組每人要和 其他51名選手分别做一輪搭檔,每輪打二副牌.換言之,每人要打 2×51=102副牌,女子組每人要和其他27位選手分别做一輪搭檔,每次打3 副牌,即每人共打3×27=81副牌,每一輪各選手均打相同的牌,就像這次 香港舉辦的國際城市邀請賽中公開對式決賽時都打同一副牌時一樣,几 乎一半選手都獲得獎金.男子第一名獎金為USD\$8,000元,女子第一名得 USD\$5,000元.参加選手幾乎都是當今頂尖高手.例如(括弧中是這次所 得的名次及百分比成績):95年百慕大杯公開組冠軍美國際的成員Wolff Robert(3, 55.05), Hamman Bob(10, 52.30), Freeman Richard(12, 51.78), Rodwell Eric(23, 50.35), 95年百慕大杯公開組亞軍加拿大隊成 員:Kokish Eric(6, 53.70), 法國際是主辦國,共參加15人,在前十名中, 獲得第2、第4、第5、第9四個名次,相當不俗.但法國隊在參加95年百 慕大杯獲第第三名的6位成員中,成績依次爲Lebel Michel(9, 52.32), Chemla Paul(22, 50.76), Soulet Philippe(24, 50.16), Cronier Philippe (42, 47.35), Reiplinger Robert (47, 46.63), Perron(50, 46.07), 瑞典隊是95年百 慕大杯第4名,共有3名選手參加,獲得名次分别為第28、45、48. 青年 組世界冠軍隊成員之一英國Jason Hackett獲(7, 52.72),公開對式賽世界冠 軍波蘭的 Marek Szymanowski 得(8, 52.34), -第一届Generali冠軍Piotr Gamrys(41, 47.44), 其他著名成員還有巴基斯坦Zia Mahmood(11,57.97),

女子組比賽法國選手獲前二名,荷蘭選手獲第三,奧地利選手獲第四.

影星Omar Sharif(25, 49.84), Edgar Kaplan(29, 49.80), 獲得本屆冠軍的是

挪威選手Geir Helgemo(1, 57.49), 從上述參賽名單來看,可見這次錦標

The 3rd Generali (Underwriters) Group sponsored Individual Masters Championship ended on 3/May/96 in Paris. There were 52 Participants in the Open (All men this year) and 28 in the Ladies. The tournament required each of the competitors to partner every others and for the open, (played) 2 hands, or, 2x51=102 boards; for the ladies, 3, or 3x27=81 boards. Like the Hong Kong Inter-city Pairs Final, every table played the same board at the same time.

Almost half the players would get cash prize, the champion in the open, US\$8,000 and in the ladies US\$5,000. Nearly all the particpants were the very top players in the world today. Like, (bracketed are the position and the percentage obtained) the 1995 Bermuda Bowl champions, USA's Bobby Wolff (3rd, 55.5%), Bob Hamman (10th, 52.30%), Richard Freeman (12th, 51.78%), Eric Rodwell (23rd, 50.35%). The Bermuda runners-up Canadian Eric Kokish came 6th, 53.70%. France was the host country and had 15 representatives, achieving 2nd, 4th, 5th, 9th, quite impressive but the astonishing part was, that their 6 national team members who took the Bermuda bronze medals, could achieve only: Michel Lebel (9th, 52.32), Paul Chemla (22nd, 50.76%), Philippe Soulet (24th, 50.16%), Philippe Cronier (42nd, 47.35%), Robert Reiplinger(47th, 46.63%) and Perron (50th, 46.07%).

The Swedish Team who were 4th in the Bermuda, had 3 members here, but fared only 28th, 45th and 48th positions. England's Jason Hackett, member of the reigning world junior champions, was 7th, 52.72%; Poland's M. Szymanowski, world open pairs champion came 8th, 52.34%, and Mahmood was 11th, 51.97%, movie star Omar Sharif came 25th 49.84% while Edgar Kaplan 29th with 49.80%.

This year's winner was Norway's Geir Helgemo with 57.49%. From this starstudded list, we can see the quality of this tournament. In the Ladies, the French took the first 2 places, Holland third while Australia fourth.

Here are a few hands played by the champion G. Helgemo, only 26 years of age. (Positions switched for easy reading).

Helgemo坐南,首攻是◆Q,如果你是南,不看東西的牌,是不是在第2墩,立刻打*AK,送出第三副*,如果*是3-2分配,莊家也只有九墩牌.在對式賽來講,不會是好成績.在具體這副牌上,莊家打二副*以後,已不能完成定約,這時莊家最佳是打♥,東♥K進手後,打◆,莊家忍讓.這樣,防守方已取得2副*,2副♥,1副◆而下一.在這些頂尖的參賽牌手中,也有好几位是這樣打的.且看Helgemo的打法.他贏進◆首攻後,第2墩打*8,西出*5,明手放*6過去.(這是實際打法,如果西出*Q,明手贏進後,將用◆K回手再出*,這樣*只輸一墩).莊家贏得*後,再出一副*,然後從明手出♥東用♥K贏進,再出◆,莊家忍讓,這樣防守已經有結果,防守方一共只得二墩紅心,一墩◆,莊家以630分得幷列頂分.

Helgemo was South, opening lead was ◆Q. If you were South, without seeing the east-west hands, would you have played immediately ♣A, ♣K and a third Club? If Clubs were 3-2 distributed, there were 9 tricks, nothing significant in such a Pairs event and in this hand, after the top 2 Clubs, the contract would probably fail. Declarer could best now play Hearts, after east's capturing his ♥K and Diamond return and ducked, the defence had 2 Clubs, 2 Hearts and 1 diamond for one down, a line adopted by severaal competitors here.

Helgemo played differently, after winning the Diamond lead, he led the $\clubsuit8$, West played small but so was dummy. (Had west played an honor, dummy would win, coming back to hand with the $\clubsuit K$, now a small Club towards table would restrict Clubs to one loser only). He next played one high Club then a small Heart from table, east took with $\blacktriangledown K$ to return a Deamond, ducked and end of defence taking no more than 1 diamond and 2 Hearts. +630 was a shared top well earned.



Without a club lead, declarer could quite easily make his contract, Helgemo, west, though, did lead his \$4, can you think of a way to score 12 tricks? Many players, including Tim Seres failed, playing Hearts normally breaking. But this declarer was Poland's P. Gawrys and found a line of success.

He won the lead with A, played off A, K, small Heart to dummy's Ace and K to discard A in hand and ruffed a Spade (east' A falling suggested 4-5 distribution in the red suits and the winning line of play). Next a diamond was ruffed low and A led, ruffed by east and over-ruffed, another diamond was ruffed in dummy with A and another winning Spade, east ruffed and declarer discarded a Diamond leaving his hand all high.

Although east-west had only 24 points, the distribution in this hand was such that 3NT was makeable. Had west passed 2H, he could get +300 for 3 down but it was difficult at the table, 2S doubled should go no more than 1 down and any defensive slip, even for someone strong as Rodwell, could enable the contract to come home. Helgemo was against sitting west and led \$3, east played 3 rounds, ruffed by declarer Chemla who played Spade to dummy's K, won by east. Rodwell now slipped and forced with a 4th Diamond. Chemla ruffed, 2 more Spades then \$4. West won with Ace but had no exit card: no Spades or Diamonds, a Heart was non-playable so exited with \$J. Chemla naturally read the \$A position (East had already shown up with \$A, \$K\$ and \$A, \$K\$, west doubled 2H) and duly made his contract.

contract. The defense had a horrible time but Hamman truly displayed his talent that impressed even Lady Luck.

1996慕達斯圖區橋牌冠軍賽 1996 Modesto Regional Bridge Championship

L.L.Lee,Thomas Ng,Chan Yiu,Chris Chung 一行四人在去美國旅行途 中,順道參加了美國的分區橋牌錦標賽,這次分區橋牌冠軍賽是在加利 福尼亞的慕達斯圖市舉行,一共比賽七日,從10月14日到10月20日,公開 隊式賽於18、19二日舉行,共有43隊參加.按大師分分爲三級,300分以 下為C級,共16隊參加;300-1500分的為B級,共15隊參加;1500分以上為A 級,共12隊參加,全美各地的牌手均可參加,我們四人中,一人爲香港 超級大師,三人爲終身大師,所以組委接受我們參加A級隊的賽事. A級 12隊分成每三個隊一組,淘汰一隊.共剩下的8隊再打淘汰賽,每場打28 副牌,在預賽中我們分别以37:18、60:19戰勝對手進入8名之内, 抽簽 结果,我們首先要對的是前世界冠軍Frederick Hamilton在内的隊,但 Thomas Ng一對防守非常好,出乎意料以97:59戰勝對手進入前四名.接 下來的一場對我們又是一場挑戰,對手是全美青年隊,他們做莊和防守 都非常漂亮,唯一是叫牌不那么准確. 结果我們又以76:57(上半時34:38 落後4IMP)戰勝對手, 進入決審. 全美青年隊隊員很有風度, 除技術熟練 外,在隊員叫到一錯誤定約時,從不責備隊員,而是靜靜地盤算少宕一副. 在我們獲勝後,隊長還走到我們這邊,和我們一一握手,口中不停地講: 你們打得好! 你們打得好!真值得我們學習.決審時,我們防守的不夠好 以85:87(2IMP之差)落敗,獲得亞軍.每人可得21.85金分.應該說全美青 年隊打得最好,我們獲勝實在幸運.不一定能戰勝的隊我們戰勝了.決賽 時,我們最有機會獲勝,因為決賽的對手是在預賽中以18:37輸給我們 的隊,結果仍失之交臂,這説明我們還不夠成熟,還有待改進,下面舉出 一些我們獲勝的牌例:

The quartet of L.L.Lee, Thomas Ng, Chris Chung and Chan Yiu went to the States for sightseeing, on the way they part in a USA regional championship in Modesto, California. The tournament was held from 14/Oct/96 to the twentieth, the open team on the 18th and 19th, 43 teams participated, divided into 3 flights: 0-300 master points in C, 301-1500 in B and the rest, A, all players from the States could join in As we had a grand master and 3 life masters in the team, the organizing committee granted our request of participating in the flight A event of 12 teams. We were divided into groups of 3 where 1 team would be eliminated, the last 8 would be on a knock-out basis, 28 boards in each match.

In the preliminaries, we won both matches, 37:18 and 60:19. In the next stage, we drew lots and met a team that included a former world champion Fred Hamilton. But our pair of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Ng defended well and we came out 97:59. Our next

opponents were an All U.S. Youth Team whose declarer and defense play were good though not matched by their bidding, we won again 76:57. The team was impressive, thorough techniques, never uttered a word of discontent but played quietly on , after the match, their captain congratulated each of us warmly saying you played well. In the final, our defense was not good and lost 85:87. Each of us could get 21.85 gold points.

I would say the All U.S. Youth Team played the best bridge and we were indeed lucky to win. In the final we had our chances but didn't grab them. The champion team was the one we defeated 37:18 in the preliminaries. Here are some hands from the tournament.

Facts: North's hesitation before bidding 2♥ was agreed and registered. The Director was summoned to rule the justification of South's 3♦ bid and subsequent contract.

Director's Ruling : Director ruled the score should stand as South's hand is stronger than he promised and hence warrants an extra bid (in this case South chose to bid 3 •). EW appealed, stating that by the reopening double South had already shown his hand. The hesitation by North before bidding 2♥ conveyed unauthorised information and South had utilised it.

Committee Decision: The committee voted 3:2 in favour of allowing the score of 3NT+1 to stand, the deposit to be refunded.

The commonly accepted principle is that after a hesitation by a player then his partner should pass if the action (i.e. to bid on) "could have been suggested" by the hesitation (Law 16A2). Here, the committee try to decide :

- a) Does North's hesitation categorically suggest South should bid on?
- and b) Is it reasonable for South to bid on, with or without the hesitation?

We have splitted opinions both on (a) as well as (b). One view being that the hesitation clearly indicates extra value - more than a mere escape bid, hence this hesitation does make it easier for South to carry on. Another view is that North's hesitation does not necessarily indicates a good hand, North might be considering pass, choosing between 2♥ or 2♠ or 3♣, none of this suggested South must bid. One might not agree with the subsequent NS actual bids but that is probably irrelevant. The panel ruled 3:2 in favour of the latter view.

Whether South should bid on is again debatable. Some think because South had already reopened with the double, facing a minimum 2Ψ bid, he did not have the extra to bid on. On the other extreme, one member consider it natural for South to bid on given the fact that NS was known to have the balance of power, and from South's point of view he needs very little from North to make 4Ψ , as little as XX, QJXXX, XXXX, XX and in any case 3Ψ should be safe. Another view somewhere in between being that it was reasonable for South to bid on, though he was certainly taking a calculated risk.

The question of 'logical alternative' also comes into the picture, according to the view of some of the committee member, as well as after consulting WBF's Chief Tournament Director, after the hesitation by North, as long as 'Pass' by South is a 'logical alternative', this will be the standard guideline that South should pass under such circumstances.


