4. Questionnaire to Members

2. Matters Arising from Minutes of the Last Meeting

- -- CC has not yet collected the entry fee from the Ladies Team that will take part in the World Team Olympiad in Greece.
- SS has not yet drafted an article for publication in Bridgzette SS re-emphasizing the importance of properly filled-up convention cards.
- -- C.C. Wong, the responsible director of the Inter-city Trial, forgot the details of the incident where a player was found to have wrongly claimed hand and made remark before the bidding ended. SS will wait for C.C. Wong's report before issuing warning letter to this player. This warning letter will be published in Bridgzette later.
- -- The Mixed Pairs event has been re-scheduled from 29/10/1996 to 29/11/1996 so that members of the Ladies team may play in this tournament after they come back from World Team Olympiad in Greece. SW will include this change in tournament schedule in the coming announcement to members.
- -- AC will revise the scheduling of junior directors before assigning which tournaments SS will be responsible for (at least 2 per month) in order to meet the criteria laid down by the Council before he may resume his status as qualified director.

3. Progress on Intercity 1996

The accounts have not vet been finalised.

Progress on PABF Championship 1997

AC will send invitation letters to PABF member NCBOs in November. Letters requesting for sponsorship in conjunction with Intercity 1997 will also be sent out in November.

Although there will be 3 VU graph sessions each day, the commentator will only be present at the evening session (3rd session). DZ will contact Samuel Wan to see whether the latter will be interested in being the commentator to whom free air ticket and hotel accommodation will be provided. Guest speakers are welcome in the 1st and 2nd VU graph session. The VU graph room will open 10 minutes after match starts.

To minimise disturbance to the players, visitors cannot enter the open room 10 minutes after match starts. If they leave the room later, they cannot re-enter the open room.

Design for bar-coded playing cards has been finalised. The printed playing cards will be delivered to and stored at the warehouse Irene Ho's company is using. In addition to the 300 boards on hand, 300 more will be borrowed from the China Bridge Association.

4. Questionnaire to Members

The revised questionnaire prepared by JC was tabled for discussion. Council members are urged to give comments to JC before end of the week.

As David Chan has valid unforeseen business reasons for his unavailability, the Council has decided not to take further disciplinary action against him unless he is complained by someone else. DZ will ask for WBF's permission to the substitution of player.

- a. PABF Secretariat has sent a questionnaire to all PABF member NCBOs soliciting information on the existing relationship between NCBO and their respective National Olympic Committee. SW will reply to this before the deadline of 18/10/1996 and JM will clarify with the Amateur Sports Federation & Olympic Committee of Hong Kong the procedures to upgrade our status in the latter organisation to full membership.
- b. The Captain's Report submitted by S.K. Luk for the team took part in the All China National Championship (Division C) held in Beijing in May this year was read and adopted.
- c. AC has scheduled Lisa Lam and Raymond Mak who have completed the apprenticeship programme satisfactorily to sit for the final examination on 7/11/1996 before recognising them as qualified directors. Besides, a seminar will be held on 9/11/1996 or 16/11/1996 (Saturday) to update all directors/junior directors new guidelines on ruling.
- d. The scoring programme copied from WBF has been tested to our satisfaction. It was resolved that a budget for HK\$1,500 is set for purchasing a printer which will be used in conjunction with the above programme.
- e Feedback from hotels reviewed that the best timing for organising Intercity 1997 will be after 20/8/1997 but earlier than the scheduled Annual Meeting of World Monetary Fund in September, 1997.
- f. Samme Lee and a few other members have requested the Association to sell some of the currently used bidding boxes to them. AC advised as the Association does not have many spare ones, it is not recommendable to sell any bidding boxes to members. If they are interested in buying directly from the manufacturer in Shanghai, they may contact Kenneth Chan.

在有71隊參加的第10屆奧林匹克橋牌賽公開組比賽中,一副牌在不 同桌上出現不同的合約,本不為奇。但有一副牌在70桌上比賽時,共出 現19種不同的合約。大概讀者是想不到的。

這副牌最多桌的合約是由北主打4S被加倍,結果18桌打成+790。 (我們以+表示南北得分,-表示東西得分)10桌下一(-200分);其次是西 打4H,共14桌,4桌超一(-650),10桌超二(-680);叫到6H的有10桌, 其中一桌被加倍,當然都完成定約;南北方得分最多的是加倍東主打 6NT,下四(+1100);居然有二桌會莫名其妙叫到6NT,東西得分最多的 是由西主打6H再加倍(-2070),及由東主打6D再加倍(-1830);當然還有 其它的結果。例如5D、5H、5C、6S等,有的還被加倍。最值得留意的是 有5桌由東主打6D被加倍。有三桌南首攻♥擊敗定約,他們是巴基斯坦、 波蘭、土耳其選手。最成功犧牲叫6S的是荷蘭隊。這副牌是:





Twenty-fourth out of thirty-six was an unexpected and an unwanted outcome.

HK Open Team prepared the tournaments as past years. After the trial, players fine trimmed their partnership agreements individually. Other than participating in local tournaments and The HK Inter-city Championships, two full day practice sections were held in September and October. Performance was satisfactory.

Prospecting to repeat or even to over-take the achievement of 1992, the original strategy of The team was: Zen-Chun & Ling-Chan would play aggressive games against unheralded teams to effectuate big scores. Hsi-Chiu would stay on the conservative side and would play most of the big names hoping to maintain no big tumble.

However the team suffered immense shock when Player Mr. David Chan declared his last minute exit.

For reasons only known to himself Mr. Chan (Through his partner Mr. Roger Ling) announced his withdrawal nine days before the start the of the tournament. The short-notice left the team with parsimoniously no choice for his substitution. Had Mr. Anthony Ching not generously committed to squeeze time from his tight job schedule, The Team would have faced abortion.

Ling-Ching had only one week to build their partnership. The Team expected the pair to play steady games. Our objective was lowered to

'hit average'

Nevertheless, team morale sustained enormous impact.

To give an excuse to our unpretentious result, I would blame the geographic location of the venue that required some 20 hours to fly in from HK. Unlike most other teams who enjoyed the privilege of arriving several days before the kick-off, our players only disembarked one day or 15 hours before commencement of play. Some looked weary. Such effect was reflected on the very first day. We were badly blitzed by Chinese Taipei and Italy.

By the time The Team found their feet, luck deprived us. Thereafter, The Team was struggling in 'below average' positions. We merely lost to all strong contenders. What hurt most was that we were unable to handle those with calibre alike us. Some even assaulted us with single digit scores.

Throughout the tournament, Every player was paying his optimum effort. Team harmony in terms of Bridge was occasionally overthrown due to wicked results. Too eager to win provoked accusation between partners and team mates.

However, after counselling, hot tempered members were able to hold their composure and kept cool in forthcoming matches. Towards the final stage of the race, HK players showed laceration of stamina. Misjudgement, unforced errors not to mention silly mistakes surfaced. To rub salt to the wound, Chiu needed to leave The Team on the last day due to business commitments. That left the remaining two pairs to round off the last three matches.

Lack of datum from the organising body prohibited me from preparing the pair performance charts. Likewise, I have no intention to put blame on specific member or pair. The bitter experience had already chastised everybody.

If the HK Open Team represented the standard of HK Bridge, I had to say that for the past four years, we did not accomplish any advancement if not retarding. Looking at the glorious triumphs of our fellow Zone Six counterparts (Chinese Taipei and Indonesia qualified to Semi-final and final respectively while the China Ladies played in the Final), we should conceive that the margins between us and our arch rivals are widening. HK is hosting the 1997 PABF Championships. I look forward to see our council taking steps to boost our efficacy. End of report.

Tempo and the Double-Edged Sword

Anthony Ching

"Undue hesitation", as it is often referred to, is an area where a number of controversial rulings and appeals has taken place in the past few years. I would like to take this opportunity to offer my views and understanding on this issue.

The term "undue hesitation" is actually misleading. The proper term, used by the WBF in its published cases, is a "break in tempo". It refers not only to hesitations, but also to haste; not only to bidding, but also to plays. A break in tempo does not in itself constitute an infraction of the Laws, but it will often convey an extraneous message to partner. The extraneous information is "unauthorised", and making use of such information to one's advantage is an infraction of the Laws. This is stated clearly in Law 16A and Law 73D in the Laws of Duplicate Contract Bridge (1987, and revised September 1990).

In Law 16 - Unauthorised Information, the introductory paragraph stated that players are only "authorised to base their actions on information on legal calls or plays and from mannerisms from opponents. To base action on other extraneous information is an infraction of law." This defines authorised information to 3 sources as underlined above.

Law 16A - Extraneous Information from Partner, continues to say that "After a player makes available to his partner extraneous information that may suggest a call or play, as by means of a remark, a question, a reply to a question, or by unmistakable hesitation, unwonted speed, special emphasis, tone, gesture, movement, mannerism or the like, the partner may not choose from among logical alternative actions one that could reasonably have been suggested over another by the extraneous information." The first part deals with information which is not within the terms of the sources of authorised information. Just to clarify, examples of such actions which may convey unauthorised information include:

- a remark;
- · a question;
- the answer to a question:
- · special emphasis or tone of voice;
- · a gesture, movement, mannerism;
- attention to opponent's convention card at a significant moment when not his turn to call
 or play;
- · examining opponent's convention card when dummy;
- an unmistakable hesitation, or undue haste, in calling or in playing a card;
- or indeed any action which can suggest that a particular call or play is more likely to prove successful than another.

A player who has received unauthorised information <u>must</u> seek to avoid taking any advantage from it. This is especially true in bidding where the WBF Laws Committee has stated that "When a player takes an out-of-tempo bid at a crucial moment in the auction, his opponent will <u>always</u> get the benefit of the doubt from the arbitrators".

Since the last revision of the Laws, the 75% rule has been replaced by "logical alternatives", as stated in Law 16A. This will be the basis of ruling by the Directors and the Appeals Committee under the Laws: the player receiving the unauthorised information must choose the worst possible logical alternative. So what is a "logical alternative"? This is explained in the Commentary to the Laws published by the European Bridge League in 1992:

"We broadly interpret a logical alternative as being a call or play which 3 or more in 10 players of equal ability to the player whose call or play is in question could be expected to make in the particular situation, using all the legal inferences from the auction and play, but undisturbed by possession of any illicit information."

The Directors, since the 1987 Laws revision, are "forbidden" to make reasonable decisions. When in doubt, their jobs are to rule in favour of the non-offending side. This will often put the burden on the Appeals Committee who must now avoid using its own standard of bridge in coming up with a ruling.

You will now ask the obvious question. Will there be a double-edged sword where the non-offending side can register the break in tempo, bid out the hand, and hope to either get a good result or redress? The answer is not at all clear cut here. An expert player who knows the Laws well will be able to take the maximum advantage provided under the Laws in this situation. We must remember, however, that the purpose of the Laws is to provide equity and justice, not to compensate for bad bridge judgement. A player, to be entitled to redress, must first prove damage and his bridge must be of a quality, considering the circumstances, to be worthy of an adjustment. It is the duty of the Directors and the Appeals Committee to ensure that this spirit of the Laws is upheld.

So when must a player protect himself when there is an apparent break in tempo. This is provided in detail in Law 16AI, which deals with the determination of facts: "When a player considers that an opponent has made such (extraneous) information available, and that damage could well result, he may, unless the regulations of the sponsoring organisation prohibit, immediately announce that he reserves the right to summon the Director later (the opponents should summon the Director immediately if they dispute the fact that unauthorised information have been conveyed)." The regulations of the HKCBA do not prohibit such a move, and a player should always exercise his rights provided under the Laws.

Law 16A2 deals with the infraction and-damage, and timing for a player to protect himself: "When a player has substantial reason to believe (when play ends; or, as to dummy's hand, when dummy is exposed) that an opponent who had a logical alternative has chosen an action that could have been suggested by such (extraneous) information, he should summon the Director forthwith. The Director shall require the auction and play to continue, standing ready to assign an adjusted score if he considers that an infraction of law has resulted in damage." It is to a player's advantage that once the infraction is suspected, the Director be called immediately. The Laws stipulates that a Director must let the players finish the hand before accessing damage, and a double-edged situation may well result.

The laws covering unauthorised information and break in tempo have been enforced more and more severely by the WBF Appeals Committees since the 1990 revision. The 3 cases at the end of this article will demonstrate this trend. Unfortunately, a reveal of the appeal cases handled by our Appeals Committee in the past few years have shown that we are still back in the dark ages, inconsistent with the WBF direction which our representatives must face in international competitions.

What the WBF is starting to enforce from the 1996 World Bridge Team Olympiad in its Appeals Goals and Rules of Behaviour will further demonstrate my point.

Goal 4: "To encourage the use of Active Ethics (AE), which might be defined as going above and beyond that which is normally expected to help raise our expert game to a level that corresponds with the intellectuality of our game and the players playing it."

Goal 6: "Hesitation disruption (HD), an age old bridge problem, must be policed by making a player aware that once his partner hesitates he will be under a special ethical responsibility (SER) to 'lean over backwards' not to take advantage; appeals committees will take this into account in rendering their decisions."

Behaviour 2: "Because bridge is a partnership game, behaviour that may be tolerated in games like poker or chess is not appropriate, nor should it be tolerated. Gestures, intonations, attitude, improper tempo, and general body language will undoubtedly have some effect on the judgement of other players. When it might affect partner's judgement, such behaviour is reprehensible. since playing bridge behind screens is relatively new, and at times produces unique situations, it may become necessary for AE to encourage players to feel compelled to protect their opponents."

<u>Behaviour 3</u>: "Bridge is expected to be played in a relatively 'even' temponeither too slow nor too fast. Remember, at this level of expertise quick plays and slow plays are likely to convey unauthorised information. Violations may easily boomerang because SER prevents partner from taking advantage."

Again, the message is quite clear here. The WBF is asking its Directors and Appeals Committees to strictly enforce the Laws that deal with tempo violations, and to <u>always</u> rule in favour of the non-offending side when there is the slightest of doubt.

In coming up with the following cases, I have reviewed the collection of appeals at major championships published by the EBL and the WBF since 1992. Although there are differing views from different Appeals Committees, and that some of the decisions differ significantly from the rest, those are the minorities. Where the decisions differ from the WBF direction, they have been rightly criticised by other non-participating members of the same Appeals Committee. The 3 cases (including the comments) I have chosen are representative samples of the WBF direction of how "break in tempo" should be judged.

<u>Director's Ruling</u>: The Director ruled that S had unauthorised information and the double should be cancelled. NS appealed.

Appeals Committee: Accepted that many players of this calibre would double on south's hand in the absence of a tempo violation and were of the opinion that this NS pair would double; however, once there is a tempo violation it becomes a question of what proportion of players of this standard would double and the Committee were not satisfied it would clearly be as many as seven in ten. The Director's ruling was upheld.

<u>Comments</u>: Some would think this is a close decision in expert play, but the Appeals Committee were right to resolve any margin of doubt in favour of the non-offending side.

<u>Director's Ruling</u>: The Director felt that pass was a logical alternative to 4S. However, East would surely double 4H and West would surely bid 4S. So, the outcome would be the same. The score was allowed to stand.

Committee Decision: The contract be changed to 4H making four, +420 for NS.

<u>Comment</u>: If EW felt there were "wronged", perhaps E should realise he shouldn't study long and then pass and expect equal treatment. He won't get it!

<u>Director's ruling</u>: The Director ruled that E's 6C bid could have been suggested by the unauthorised information from W's hesitation, and that pass was a logical alternative to 6C. The contract was adjusted for both pairs to 5C by W made six, +620 for EW.

Appeal: EW testified that 4D showed a diamond control (1st or 2nd) and 4H a heart control. E contended that W's 5C bid denied spade control and that he bid 6C because he had the missing control. However, in response to the committee's questions the EW team captain confirmed that W could have cue-bid 4D holding the same hand but with KQx instead of AKx. It was also determined that 4NT by W over 4H would have been RKCB.

Committee's Decision: The committee determined that W's break in tempo could have suggested E's 6C bid, and that pass was a logical alternative to 6C. The contract was therefore adjusted for both pairs to 5C by W made six, +620 for EW. Although there was some strong sentiment for retaining EW's deposit, it was finally returned.
